NOTE: By Constitutional Amendment adopted May 17, 1920, Article III, Section 1, quoted below, was changed so that any man of 18 years of age is eligible to membership. Junior memberships have been abolished entirely.

ANCESTOR'S SERVICE

"Section 1. Any man shall be eligible to membership in the Society who, being of the age of eighteen years or over, and a citizen of good repute in the community, is the lineal descendant of an ancestor who was at all times unfailing in his loyalty to, and rendered active service in, the cause of American Independence, either as an officer, soldier, seaman, marine, militiaman, or volunteer, or as a man in the armed forces of the Continental Congress, or of any one of the several Colonies, States, or a signer of the Declaration of Independence; or as a member of a Committee of Safety or Correspondence; or as a member of any Continental, Provincial, or Colonial Congress or Legislature; or as a recognized patriot who performed actual service by overt acts of resistance to the authority of Great Britain." — Constitution of National Society S. A. R., Article III, Section 1, adopted June 8, 1807, and as amended.

Membership is based upon original claim; when the applicant derives eligibility by descent from more than one ancestor, and it is desired to take advantage of separate applications, to be marked "Supplemental Application." should be made in each case and filed with the original.

State fully documentary or traditional authority as you found the following record upon, and also the residence of ancestors, with dates of birth and death, if known.

By order of the Board of Trustees, May 3, 1911, the recipient of a certificate granted on this application agrees to surrender his certificate upon failure to pay his membership fee, unless his membership shall cease by reason of death or actual disability, to be determined by the Society of which he is a member.

My ancestor's services in assisting in the establishment of American Independence during the War of the Revolution were as follows:

Joseph Dickason moved from Pennsylvania to North Carolina before the War of the Revolution. In 1780 he served with Gen. Rutherford of North Carolina in his regiment against the English, and later in the same year he was in the service of Col. McDaniel of South Carolina. During this time he was a captain in the Colonial Army and a member of the "Committee of Safety." He rendered "gallant and heroic service" at King's Mountain as major, North Carolina militia ("Lincoln County men"). In 1781, he opposed Cornwallis' invasion of North Carolina, and for "brave and efficient conduct" he was promoted to Colonel and retired at the end of the war as General of Militia.

The records are not clear as to whether he acquired the rank of General before the end of the war, but they do agree that he served as a major at King's Mountain, and that later he served as a Colonel.

From 1788-95, he was a State Senator in North Carolina, and then represented that state in Congress. 1799-1801, in 1803, he moved to Tennessee (near Murfreesboro). He was made commander of the State militia with the rank of General. He was a member of the first legislature of the State of Tennessee, and was President of the Senate, 1807, and Speaker of the House, 1809. He died at his home near Murfreesboro, April 14, 1825.

The Windham family later moved to Benton County, Arkansas, where my grandfather was born in 1839.
